Downtown leaders get recognition for revitalization efforts

News and notes from Downtown Greensboro Inc.:

Downtown Greensboro presented its third annual Report to the Community on Sept. 20 at The Empire Room.

Interim president Sherry Adams and board chairman Chester Brown gave an overview of downtown's progress, upcoming projects and what to expect in the upcoming year. The keynote speaker, Troy Russ, principal, and senior urban developer with Orlando-based Glatting Jackson Kercher Anglin, spoke about public and private partnerships for redevelopment of urban environments.

DGI also presented several awards. They included the 2007 J. Edward Kitchen Downtown Leadership Award to Jimmy Black. Black played a key role as one of the founders of DGI, serving as board chairman in 1997-98 and spearheading the growth and revitalization of downtown Greensboro with the concept of taking "baby" steps until goals were achieved.

Betty Cone was given the 2007 Downtown Person of the Year Award.

Cone was a leading force in saving the Carolina Theatre, preserving the J. Douglas Gaylon Depot, and establishing the Greensboro Cultural Center. She served on the board from DGI's inception in 1997 and still serves today.
